UNSAFE WATER ALERT

Del Oro Water – Tulare District, Grandview Gardens Service Area water is possibly contaminated due to loss of pressure

DO NOT DRINK YOUR WATER

Failure to follow this advisory could result in illness.

Due to a power outage caused by a vehicle accident, **Del Oro Water's Tulare District – Grandview Gardens Service Area** experienced a loss of pressure on 4/10/2021. The State Water Resources Control Board, Tulare County Health Department, and Del Oro Grandview Gardens Water System are advising residents served by the Grandview Gardens Service Area to **NOT USE THE TAP WATER FOR DRINKING AND COOKING UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.**

What should I do?

- **DO NOT DRINK YOUR TAP WATER---USE ONLY BOTTLED WATER.** Bottled water should be used for all drinking (including baby formula and juice), brushing teeth, washing dishes, making ice and food preparation **until further notice.**
- **DO NOT TRY AND TREAT THE WATER YOURSELF.** Boiling, freezing, filtering, adding chlorine or other disinfectants, or letting water stand will not make the water safe.
- Potable water is being distributed by Del Oro personnel door-to-door 4/10/2021.

We will inform you when tests show that the water is safe again. We expect to resolve the problem within three (3) business days.
